Laurinburg High School,
 RICHMOND COUNTY, N. C.
 THE Richmond Committee will receive applications for a Principal Teacher to have charge of the above Institution. The buildings, which are spacious and convenient, are situated in a healthy and pleasant neighborhood, and will be prepared for the reception of Teachers and Students early in July next, when the Institution is expected to go into operation.

"Laurinburg High School" is gotten up by a joint stock company, who intend making it one of the best, and the best of the kind in the State.
