The height of the Pilot Mountain (says Dr. Caldwell) is 1750 feet above the level of Gray's Creek, which is the nearest stream. The view from the Pinnacle is said to be the grandest of any other point in the Southern States, embracing Kings Mountain, in the East; S. C., the Table Rock in Greenville Dist., S. C., all of which are 100 miles or more distant, a full view of the Blue Ridge from North East to South West, and the Allegheny as far as the eye can reach, the Peaks of Otter, the Buffalo Lump, and many other points in Virginia. A view from four States can be had at the same time.  
The Pilot for the last season has been much visited by strangers from all parts of the United States. The ascension to the Pinnacle is now safe by steps and ladders from the House kept by the Subscriber, and is had on his back and arms, carried by former ascenders. Near the House is a fine Mineral Spring, the properties of which are Sulphur, Iron and Magnesia, and the Subscriber's House, as he is the sole proprietor and owner of the Pilot Mountain.
