### Pilot Mountain.

THIS Great Natural Curiosity is situated in Surry County, N. C., two miles west of the Stokes line, on the main road leading from Salem west—distance 25 miles, Germantown 18 miles, Bethany 17 miles, and within 5 miles of the Stage line from the above places across the Blue Ridge by Mount Airy to the Station Springs in Virginia. The height of the Pilot Mountain says Prof. Caldwell is 1759 feet above the level of Grassy Creek, which is the nearest stream. The view from the Pinnacle is said to be the grandest of any other point in the Southern States, embracing Kings Mountain in the West, S. C., the Table Rock in Greenville, S. C., all of which are 100 miles or more distant; a full view of the Blue Ridge from North East to South West, and the Allegheny as far as the eye can reach. The Peaks of Otter, the Buffalo Hunt, and many other points in Virginia. A view into four States can be had at the same time.

The Pilot for the last season has been much visited by strangers from all parts of the United States. The ascent to the Pinnacle is now safe by steep and rocky ladders from the House kept by the Subscriber, one and a half miles south of the Mountain. A good carriage road within six hundred yards of the Pinnacle; a good Guide will always be ready to wait on strangers. No pains will be spared to wait on visitors and make them comfortable with every thing the country affords. The Stables are well supplied with corn, fodder and hay.
