Pilot Mountain.
THIS Great Natural Curiosity situated in Surry County, N. C., two miles west of the Stokes line, on the main road leading from Salem west—distance 25 miles, Germanton 18 miles, Bethany 17 miles, and within 3 miles of the Stage line from the above places across the Blue Ridge by Mount Airy to the Sulphur Springs in Virginia. C., all of which are 100 miles or more distant; a full view of the Blue Ridge from North East to South West, and the Alleghany as far as the eye can reach, the Peaks of Otter, the Buffalo Hump, and many other points in Virginia. A view into four States can be had at the same time.
