## THE GLOBE.

### The Official Paper of Congress.

PUBLISHED now my annual Prospectus of THE DAILY GLOBE and THE CONGRESSIONAL GLOBE and APPENDIX to remind subscribers, and inform those who may desire to subscribe, that Congress will meet on the first Monday of next December, when I shall recommence publishing the above named papers. They have been published so long that most public men know their character, and therefore I deem it needless to give a minute account of the kind of matter they will contain.

The DAILY GLOBE will contain a report of the Debates in both branches of Congress, as taken down by reporters equal, at least, to any corps of short hand writers in this or in any other country. A majority of them will, each, be able to report, *verbatim*, ten thousand words an hour, while the average number of words spoken by fluent speakers rarely exceeds seven thousand five hundred words an hour. When the debates of a day do not make more than forty columns, they shall appear in the Daily Globe the next morning, which will contain, also, the news of the day, together with such editorial articles as may be suggested by passing events.

It is also my intention, from time to time, as occasion may require, to publish my reminiscences of the public men with whom I have been associated during the last twenty-eight years. Anecdotes of General Jackson, and the leaders of the party which he conducted, and the leading men of other parties, will, I believe, be interesting now when partisan bitterness has become so intense.

In becoming the reporter of the debates of Congress I deemed it proper to say that the Globe would never be a partisan paper. This pledge will not be forfeited by introducing a controversy into the history of the political traits of character which distinguished the public men of my time. Although I am, and intend to remain, a thorough Democrat, I will never obtrude my principles in a way to make them obnoxious to any party. In regard to persons and events which go to make up history, I hope to make the Globe an honest memoir; and with that view I am resolved to speak independently of all parties.

The CONGRESSIONAL GLOBE and APPENDIX will contain a report of all the debates in Congress, revised by the speakers, the Messages of the President of the United States, the Annual Reports of the Heads of the Executive Departments, the Laws passed during the session, and copious indexes to all. They will be printed on a double royal size, in book form, royal quarto size, each number containing six or seven hundred words, which will make, it is believed, between 3,800 and 3,900 pages, as the long sessions for many years have ranged between those numbers, and the next session will be what is termed a "long one." This I believe is the cheapest work ever sold in any country, whether a reprint or printed from manuscript copy, taking for data the average number of words of the long sessions since the year 1848. The average number of pages is 3,876, and the average number of words on a page is 2,397, consequently the average number of words of a long session is 9,290,772. An act of Congress authorizes these papers to go by mail free of postage. The next session will be, without doubt, an unusually interesting one, as it will be the first under a new Administration, and several important questions must be discussed in it; for example, the currency, Kansas, revenue, and other questions. The Globe will be, as heretofore, the only source from which full debates can be obtained.

## United States of America.

**District Court of the United States for the District of Cape Fear, in the District of North Carolina.**

**WHEREAS** a libel has been filed in the District Court of the United States, for the District of Cape Fear, in the District of North Carolina, on the 13th day of November, 1857, by William M. Harris, against the Bark J. W. Blodget, her tackle, apparel, furniture and cargo, alleging in substance, that the said Bark while on her homeward voyage from Turks Island to the Port of New York, laden with salt, about the 12th of September last encountered a severe storm and by the violence of the winds and the waves, was driven upon Buzzard's Bay Beach, and that thereupon the Captain and Commander of said Bark, David Moore, left his said Bark upon said Buzzard Bay Beach, and came to the port of Wilmington and consigned said Bark to the Libellant and asked for a Tow Boat to receive said Bark from her perilous position and to bring her into the Port of Wilmington to receive such repairs as were necessary to enable her to prosecute successfully her intended voyage. That in obedience to the wishes of the said Captain, this Libellant procured the services of Captain Benjamin W. Berry, who with his Tug the Steamer Henrietta, proceeded to said Beach and succeeded in dragging her off, and carried the said Bark in safety to the Port of Wilmington. That upon her arrival in said Port of Wilmington, the said Libellant was obliged to pay and did actually pay bills for repairs and towage and pilotage, and also a large sum to the seamen employed on board of said Bark for their wages and made other advances more particularly set forth in the schedule annexed to the said libel, amounting to Eleven Hundred and sixty-six 75-100 Dollars. That the said advances were necessary to enable the said Bark to pursue her voyage and earn her freight, and were made in a Port where said Bark did not belong, and where the owners did not reside, and were made on the credit of the said Bark, as well as of the Owners thereof, and were to pay charges and demands which were at that time a lien on said Bark, and by the payment thereof this Libellant became in law subrogated in place of the parties to whom the payments were made, and became entitled to hold and proceed and enforce the lien of said demands for his own reimbursement. And the said Libellant further prays process against the Bark or Vessel, her apparel, tackle, furniture, for the amount due the Libellant in the premises with costs, and that the said Bark, her tackle, apparel and furniture may be condemned and sold to pay said amount with costs, charges and expenses.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the motion under the seal of the said Court to me directed and delivered, I do hereby give public notice to all persons claiming the said Bark, her tackle, apparel, and furniture, or in any manner interested therein, that they be and appear before the said Court to be held in and for the District of North Carolina on the second Wednesday of January next at eleven o'clock in the forenoon of the same day at Chambers in Fayetteville, if the same shall be a day of jurisdiction, otherwise on the next day of jurisdiction, that the Court to be held in and for the District of North Carolina on the second day of that behalf.
