A PROCLAMATION.
By his Excellency, THOMAS BRAGG, Governor of North Carolina.

WHEREAS, it has been represented to me that one Archibald McDougald, late of the County of Cumberland, did on the 27th day of February last, in said County, kill and murder James Munroe, and that the said McDougald was a fugitive from justice, and has escaped beyond the limits of this State.

Now, to the end that the said Archibald McDougald may be arrested and brought to trial for his said offence, I do hereby issue this my Proclamation, offering a Reward of two Hundred Dollars for his apprehension and delivery to the Sheriff of Cumberland County.

DESCRIPTION.
