This series is to consist of fewer numbers than those generally used, and it is believed that these numbers are sufficient, while if the system were universally used in the State, the sum saved to parents and children would be equal to several thousand dollars annually.

4. To put in the hands of children learning to read compositions sufficiently familiar but not of the character called childish compositions, containing, in lessons easy enough for all ages, correct specimens of style, interesting in matter, and inculcating proper morals, and religious instruction.
