To accomplish this, violence cannot be used; forcible expulsion would be contrary to every principle of our Government. It can only be done by agreement; and if the Federal Government chooses to bargain with the Mormons for their property in the Territory, and pay them liberally, with an understanding that they shall quit American soil, we do not apprehend that It would be advantageous to the fanatics themselves, for they must always be the object of hatred and opposition so long as they remain within our borders. The greater part of them would have no native ties to sunder, for they were born in other lands, and a second emigration would cost less feeling than the first. New Guinea has much to attract them-an area half a dozen times larger than the State of New York, an excellent climate, and a very degraded and a very mixed population; it is moreover free from all civilized jurisdiction. The advantage of their leaving would be as great on our side. It would free us from an enormous anomaly in our republican system, which, if allowed to remain, must, for an indefinite period hence, trouble and scandalite us ous brands and qualities, ranging in price from 18 to beyond all calculation; and it would open a large region to the ingress of an intelligent and law-prices.
