3. Economy, the popular system of Readers being too long and being more so often merely to add to the profits of authors and publishers.

This series is to consist of fewer numbers than those generally used, and it is believed that these numbers are sufficient, while if the system were universally used in the State, the sum which would be annually saved in amount to several thousand dollars annually.

4. To put in the hands of children learning to read compositions, containing, in lessons easy enough for all ages, correct specimens of style, interesting in matter, and inculcating proper morals, and religious instruction.
