The people of Fayetteville believing that there was an abundance of Coal upon Deep River, a fact we regret to say which some persons in North Carolina are still disposed to doubt, undertook to build themselves a railroad. Failing again and again in getting appropriations from the State, they still persevered and now by they own energies and by a small appropriation from the State, they have nearly completed their Road, as we learn from the Fayetteville papers that the last six miles was contracted for about a month since. This Road will, if it does nothing else, open an easy means of reaching the Coal Fields and thus cause many to visit them. They will thus become more known and even if but little coal is at present carried off it may be the means of giving some of our people information on a subject of which they are now most profoundly ignorant or careless—the vast resources of our State.

We shall at some future time here or elsewhere speak of the immense iron deposits of that section and the peculiar adaptability of the country for the erection of workshops and foundries. Asheville Advocate
