

Lost Treasure.—The oft-repeated inquiry as to "what becomes of all the pins," has puzzled the curious far less than that more serious question as to what becomes of all the silver sent to India. From the earliest history of the movements of the precious metals, down to the present time, the stream has flowed in that one direction, with only occasional return currents, not sufficient to pay even an interest on the vast capital thus sent to that vast reservoir. In the days of the Roman Empire, fifteen hundred years ago, this current attracted serious attention, and more than once led to important debate in the Senate concerning this "giving away of wealth of the State to foreign and hostile nations." The Elder Pliny computes the annual loss of silver at four million dollars, [Hist. Natur. 12, 18,] a large sum for that period; a portion of which went to Arabia, but most of it was absorbed by India in return for silks, carpets, shawls, precious stones, and in a variety of aromatics. Even then, gold was neglected in this branch of commerce; and although the quantity of both metals continued to increase in the Empire until long after the reign of Constantine, yet, notwithstanding the large production of silver, the proportion of gold was continually gaining, in consequence of this Eastern traffic.

Within the last few years the attention of cap-

italists in Europe, and especially in England, has been awakened anew to the importance of this subject. About the year 1830 the revenues of the British East India Co. were required in silver, and that limitation has continued to this day. The consequence is, that both Europe and America have been drained of silver to supply the demand.
