NON-EXISTENCE OF FROST Some months since, says the Asheville Advocate, a young friend in conversation with us gave his reasons for the existence of a belt of land on Tryon Mountain free of frost-of which so much has been said. They are the best we have ever

heard, and at our request he has written them out: "While in Polk county last Fall, I was informed by several persons of the existence of a belt of land upon the Tryon and White Oak Mountains which is rarely visited by frost. If any explanation has ever been given of this phenomenon I erally kept in wholesale and retail Stores; all of which am not aware of it. The following one was suggested to my mind after an examination of the

> "Tryon and White Oak are names given to that portion of the Saluda Chain included between Howard's Gap and Thompson's Gap-a distance of about five miles. The mountain here is the dividing ridge between Green and Pacolet Rivers, and from its superior height overlooks all the surrounding country. Green River lies at its base upon the Northern side, and Pacolet occupies the valley upon the southern side; the mountain bearing a North-easterly direction. The belt of no frost is on the South side. Its exact limits were not pointed out to me, but it is several hundred feet lower than the crest of the Ridge, a few hundred yards broad, and extends nearly the whole length of the mountain; main-

taining about the same elevation. "Points of land considerably elevated above the general level of a country, receive less dew and consequently less frost, for the reason that the air around them contains less moisture than that in the plain below; is more exposed to winds, which, mixing the different strata together, prevent the HATS, CAPS, BOOTS AND SHOES. mixing the dimerent strata together, prevent in reduction of temperature necessary for the formation of dew; and because when undisturbed by winds, it sinks down before reaching the dew WOULD beg leave to inform his friends and customers that he is now prepared to offer them one point, to take the place of the air which has become lighter from condensation of its moisture. A very gentle breeze is favorable to the deposit of

"Tryon Mt., from its isolated position, might for these reasons be left without dew upon all its sides from the top as far down as the lower limit (including the Copper-Toed Shoe for children and youths.) which he flatters himself they will find it to heir advantage to examine before purchasing elsewhere, very broad and contains much cleared land, the Green River Valley is narrow, less cultivated, less exposed to the sun, and bounded on the North by the Blue Ridge. The difference in condition of the two valleys determines a current of cold air from Green River to Pacolet across FURTHER supplies of the Southern Harmony; N. C. Renders Nos. 1, 2, 3; Monteith's Geography Nos. 1, the top of Tryon; which mirgles with, and brings to the dewpoint, those bodies of air about the top which otherwise would have deposited their moisture lower down. The North side of the mountain, facing the direction from which the current comes is entirely covered with dew. The current on reaching the south side sinks down, bringing to the dewpoint the strata it mingles with. But before reaching the line at which under other circumstances the deposit of dew would have commenced, these strata, rendered lighter by their loss of moisture than the air immediately below them, move off over the Pacolet valley. Thus a narrow strip is left without any dew, and if the night be sufficiently cold the morning presents to view a whole country whitened with frost save this dark belt along the moun-
