

a question worth considering, whether it is not, in some instances, rather of the "fast" order. Journal of Commerce Making Shoes by Steam .- The Haverhill (Mass.) Publisher gives an account of a steam shoe factory in that place for sewing the seams and pegging shoes. The machinery is all worked by a small five-horse power engine. In the basement of the building are the machines for cutting, stripping, rolling, and shaping the soles. These are then passed to a story above, where the shoes are lasted, and the outer sole tacked on by hand, which process prepares them for pegging. The pegging machines are simple in their construction and mode of operation, but perform the work with great dispatch and accuracy, driving the pegs at the rate of fourteen a second. One of the most IMESH COVE OYSTERS, HERMETICALLY SEAL- curious operations of the machine is the manner in which it manufactures the peg for its own use. A strip of wood of the required width, and neatly laid in a coil one hundred feet in length, is put W. H. CARVER. into the machine, and at every revolution it is SUGAR BUCKETS, BAL BOXES, AND MARKET BASKETS. For sale by W. H. CARVER. moved forward, and a peg cut off and driven into the shoe. The rapidity and unerring accuracy with which these machines perform their work is truly astonishing. After being pegged, the shoes are passed up to the third story, where the bottoms are smoothed, scoured, and brushed. The fourth story is occupied by the stitching machines, attended by females, but run by steam, which saves a laborious and fatigueing operation.

Towng America on his Tracels.- The Janesville (Wis.) Gazette gives the following account of the travels of a "Young America" who has just"brought up" there. Railroad Murders in Prospect .- The railroads have got to racing now after the explosive fashion of the river steamboats. The race is between the North and the South Shore lines between Buffalo and Chicago, and the racing trains run without regard to the time tables. The Cleveland Herald

We are not advised of the time at intermediate points of the North Shore train, but it arrived in Chicago at 9. 40 p. m., having performed the distance-513 miles-in 15 hours 40 minutes, or about 324 miles per hour, including stops. The South Shore train arrived in Chicago at 9.15 p. m., twenty-five minutes ahead of its competitor, having gone over 538 miles in 15 hours 15 min LARGE quantity of COTTON and LINEN RAGS, utes, or 351 miles per hour, including stops.
