

ANOTHER "INFAMOUS SWINDLE."-The Republicans, looking with admiration doubtless upon the success of the Democracy by means of "infamous swindles" embodied in platforms, have fixed up one for themselves. They have adopted the following resolution as a plank in the Chicago platform:

[NO. 924.]

"That, while providing revenue for the support of the General Government by duties upon imports, sound policy requires such an adjustment of these imports as to encourage the development of the industrial interest of the whole country; and we commend that policy of national exchanges which secures to the workingmen liberal wages, to agriculture remunerating prices, to mechanics and manufacturers an adequate reward for their skill, labor, and enterprise, and to the nation commercial prosperity and independence."

The New York Tribune, well known as a leading exponent of Republicanism, is hugely delighted at the adoption of this resolution, which it re gards as an explicit affirmation in favor of a Tariff for Protection. The New York Evening Post, another well known advocate of Republicanism, professes itself unable to find in the resolution "a single word in favor of raising the duties on imported goods; or the slightest mention of the doctrine of protection." The Post gives its interpretation of the resolution as indicated in this quotation from it and adds: "If any other construction be a fairer or a truer one, then we do \$272,765 61 not belong to the party by which the resolution is The Company have paid all losses promptly, and have never made an assessment on their premium notes. this resolution we shall hold to firmly.
