Our own Fulton discovered the power of steam, and on the very

The orator passed to consider our social progress. graphers, geologists, chemists and scientific men generally, that take rank with the best in the world. Our schools and seminaries are not excelled, except, perhaps, by those in Germany. We have painters and sculptors whose work of art would adorn the best galleries of Europe. Many of the public journals of Europe are printed upon American presses. The wheat fields of Europe are reaped by American machines. American books are found in all the considerable libraries of Europe.

Mr. Everett next considered our progress in I middle of next Summer, say till July, 1860, I have benevolent contributious and in religion. He freely authorized Archibald McLean, of Harnett county, to admitted that we often have seenes of violence in admitted that we often have scenes of violence in American cities, in the backwoods and upon the frontier settlements.
