> The latest project of the people of Chicago is one to connect the waters of Lake Michigan with those of the Gulf of Mexico by an uninterrupted channel for steamboat navigation. The original scheme of the Illinois and Michigan canal, when first projected by the State government of Illinois, comprise a ship canal of sufficient capacity to float the largest class of vessels that could navigate the Illinois river, and a considerable portion of the work was constructed upon that plan, but upon the failure of the means the design was given up and the work completed for ordinary canal boats only. Now, however, that Chicago has become a great and flourishing city, centralizing the capital, commerce, and interests of a vast region, the idea is again revived for a two-fold purpose; first to serve the ends of commerce, and second to carry off the drainage of the city of Chicago, and thus improve its sanitary condition. There are two propositions having these objects. One is to cut down the summit of the Illinois and Michigan canal, while the other is to make a new channel through Mud lake to the Aux Plaine river, and then to deepen the channel of that stream sufficiently to answer the purpose.
