Augul State of Things .- The following state ment from a New York letter to the National Intelligencer gives a painful view of the moral state of the community that gives tone to business, politics and fashion in the United States:-

"At the meeting of the Evangelical Alliance on Sunday evening many interesting facts were stated, and many of a painful character, since they show how little the ordinances of religion are attended and respected in this city as they were designed to be by every being who owns a responsible soul. The present population of New York is set down in the statistics of the Alliance at 843,741, of which only 205,580 are provided with church accommodation, leaving the appalling majority of 638,161 unprovided for. But that is not all, nor the worst. Of the 205,580 opportunities only about 100,000 are ever embraced; in other words, only about one-eighth of the population ever enter a church for the purposes of worship. Among some of the more obvious and fearenumerated infidelity, intemperance, crime, desti-

tution, danger to property, liberty and life. "We live," said one of the speakers, "upon a volcano. The flames shoot up all over the city every night in murder, in rapine, in every sort of crime. The last consequence he mentioned was death to these hapless multitudes, 600,000 men marching on, chained side by side, and that chain bound to a wheel which dragged them on to death—a death beyond which there is no sunshine, on which there shines not a solitary star.'
