

Slave Traders-Who are They!-In the course of the debate in the House of Representatives, Wednesday, on the bill appropriating \$900,-000 to execute existing laws, in reference to the African Slave Trade, some of the Southern members charged that the people who were most ac-

were "Yankees," and nobody but "Yankees." The ships engaged in it were not owned by "the South," nor sailed by "Southern" men Nay more, the "trade" was not carried on with the Southern States at all, but with the Spanish West Indies. And even Mr. Boyce, of South Carolina, went so far as to express a desire for a law to prevent those "Yankees" building ships for such piratical purposes,-while a member from Georgia expressed the belief that in all that State a hundred men could not be found in favor of re-opening the "trade." Notwithstanding all that had been said on the subject, there was no proof that any slave cargoes had ever been landed

in the Southern States, with the solitary exception of the Yacht Wanderer.
