The Reign of Anarchy.—The reign of anarchy destined to be inaugurated by such irregular and revolutionary proceedings as are now invoked in the name of "the people" of the South, has received its appropriate denomination and classification in the following weighty words of Daniel

"Is it not obvious enough that men cannot get together and count themselves and say they are so many hundreds and so many thousands, and judge of their own qualifications, and call themselves the people, and set up a government? Why another set of men, forty miles off on the same day, with the same propriety, with as good qualifications, and in as large numbers, may meet good qualifications, and in as large numbers, may meet and set up another government, and both may call themselves 'the people.' What is this but anarchy? What liberty is there here but a tumultuary, tempestuous, violent, stormy liberty—a sort of South American liberty, without power except in its spasms—a liberty supported by arms to-day, crushed by arms to-morrow.'

The object is to inflame the Legislature and hurry the State out of the Union.
