

Taxation in England.—The whole net revenue of England, for the year ending Dec. 31, 1860, amounted to £71,967,495—about equal, in round numbers, to \$360,000,000. This is but the net amount. The cost of collection, estimated an average of 8 per cent. would make the gross amount of English taxation £77,700,000 for the year just ended. Surely an immense sum is \$388,500,000 to be paid by a population smaller than our own -a population, too, the great majority of which is much poorer than our own.

It is raised thus: by Customs, 23 millions sterling; by Excise, 19 millions; by Stamps, 21 millions; by Taxes, 3 millions; by the Post Office, 32 millions; by Crown Lands, a quarter million; by Miscellaneous payments, nearly 2 millions; and by Property and Income Tax, close upon 3 millions pounds sterling. Yet, immense as is this amount, it is inadequate, by nearly 3 millions sterling, to meet the year's expenditure.
