

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


should have been submitted to the people for their ratification or rejection; secondly, that the ordinances passed by the Convention should have awaited the issue of this decision; thirdly, that the people had the right, and it should have been given them, to have chosen the delegates to a Congress which was to have framed for them a government for weal or for wo. And we now demand that the Government formed-its President, Vice President, and officers-should be submitted to the people for their approval or disapproval. If it is not, we shall, come weal or wo, attempt to fire the people's heart, to educate the people's mind to know their rights and to dare maintain them. We are no submissionist, but right is right and wrong is wrong, and we will not betray our trust. We assert that the people have a right to be heard, and, being heard, to be obeyed. And we intend to keep them posted in what we consider to be an infringement of their rights and of their privileges, let the worst come to the worst. If it is treason against the new Confederacy, make the most of it. We know we are right, and, untrammelled and unawed, we will detend the right.'

Spiteful Names .- The malignant spite of some of our "fire eating" exchanges, since they have been so signally rebuked by the people at the bailot-box on Thursday last, is as puerile as it is contemptible. They insinuate that there is an abolition party in North Carolina, who aided the Constitutional Union men to achieve our recent victory, and that the latter are unconditional submissionists. This is a base slander on the people of the State, and if their allies North-the radical abolitionists, who are, and have been working with the fire eaters for ten years or more, to destroy our government-believe their insinuations, they will be egregiously mistaken. Those that make the charge here know that it is false, and that it is the effusion of bitter malignity consequent upon disappointment in the result of the election .- Raleigh Banner.

Let the Border States Politicians Look Out. -By Article 2d, section 1st, No. 3, of the Constitution of the Confederate States of North A. merica, it is provided that-

No person except a natural-born citizen, or a citizen of one of the States of this Confederacy, at the time of the adoption of this constitution, shall be eligible to the office of President, etc.

Commenting on this, the Memphis Bulletin emarks, that this provision is not so easy of construction, and it may be well for the politicians n the Border States to understand it before jinin" the new Government. There is no difficulty in apprehending the full meaning of "natural-born citizens" as employed by the framers of the great constitution under which we have lived so long and so gloriously prospered; but in its new application there appears to be ambiguity
