Exciting Scene in a Theatre. - The orchestra of the St. Charles Theatre, New Orleans, were reckless enough on the night of the 2nd instant as to give at different intervals of the performance several patriotic old airs-Yankee Doodle included-all of which were vociferously applauded The effect produced is thus described by the Sunday True Delta:

"When the Star Spangled Banner was struck up it was immediately and loudly applauded, and 'Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean,' with its refrain, made the house ring. One enthusiastic individual jumped up and shouted 'hurrah!' and then there was a tumult. The audience evidently were on our side, believing with us that the airs should never be ignored. That's right, stick to them; never mind what one-horse politicians and place hunters say. Let all such as forget the glories of the past sing the Marseillaise, or any other foreign national air; let the true native and adopted American cling to our old airs and refuse to give them up to large audience at the St. Charles, we recognised the ab-sence of more politicians and the presence of the people, in whose hearts live the liveliest recollections of the grand memories of Washington, Jefferson, Madison, Monroe and Jackson. Hence the enthusiasm when the orchestra sounded the notes of the patriotic songs of our patriotic song writers."

More Plucking of the Goose. - The famous Japanese swindle has been outdone; publicans have been found who surpass the Lelands, and Albany eclipses New York. Mr. Lincoln and his suite are more prodigious feeders and drinkers than the No-Kamis. They remained for less than one day at the Delavan House in Albany, and a bill was rendered to the amount of eleven hundred and twenty dollars. As there were eighteen persons in the party, two of whom, Mr. and Mrs. Lincoln, did not dine in the hotel, the expense for each person, three-quarters of a day, was just seventy dollars! Included in this bill was a charge of three hundred and fifty-seven dollars for wine, or above twenty-two dollars or nine bottles a head. We are not surprised, after such drinking, at a considerable charge for Congress water. Neither is it wonderful that the breakages for stoves, chairs, and so forth, were set down at a hundred and fifty dollars. Fellows with nine bottles of liquor under their belts must have been in a state to break everything about them, even their necks. When the Prince of Wales was at Albany, with a retinue of thirty persons, his bill at Congress Hall for two days was two hundred and fifty dollars, including sixty dollars given to servants. How moderate in comparison with the traveling party of the President elect! Mr. Lincoln being a rigid temperance man, the keepers of the Delavan have probably taken their revenge upon him in this manner.—N. Y. Fost.

The Lost Sloop of War Levant .- The almost certainty now that the U.S. sloop of War Levant has been lost in the Pacific gives a melancholy interest to the following paragraph-foreshadowing her fate, as it were-from one of Mr. Russell's letters, from Malta to the London Times in
