Hore is the State to be Sustained?-In view of the passage of a stay law by the Legislature, the above question is a pertinent one. How is the State to get money to carry on the Government? We know that the Banks have loaned the State liberally heretofore, but the stay law will materially cramp the Banks and put it out of their pow-

er to aid the State much further. The Banks have loaned much of their capital to individuals, and it is not probable that those individuals are going to trouble themselves to pay back while the stay iaw is in force. If the Legislature chooses to pass a law which effectually puts a dead lock on business and the circulation of money, how and where can the State expect to raise the funds to defray public expense?
