Yankee Finances .- The Northern Banks have agreed to loan the Lincoln Government 50 millions more-making a hundred of the hundred undertaken to advance. The Government, which borrows, is bankrupt, and the Banks, which lend, are many millions worse than nothing. We published their own statement last week, which showed that with only 49 millions of specie, they owed depositors and note holders upwards of 170 millions. But the Government must have some sort of means to defray its baily expenses, and, therefore, it concocts this scheme with the Banks to meet the present emergency. The Banks undertake to lend a hundred millions -which they have not got, and they receive from the Government its own treasury notes, with which to make the payment. In other words,

less paper imposed upon the community as so much money. The Banks have no alternative.
