PROCLAMATION By His Excellency, Henry T. Clark, Governor of the State of North Carolina. EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, Raleigh, Oct. 3rd, 1861. In pursuance of the power given me by the 15th section of the Constitution, and by and with the advice of the Council of State, I hereby prohibit the exportation beyond the limits of this State, of all beaver, buck, leather, men's shoes, woolen goods, jeans, flannels and blankets—except through the orders of the proper officers of the Confederate Government, or of the State Government.

The order of the 13th ult. is hereby revoked. The Adjutant General is directed to employ all necessary means to carry into full effect this order. Done at the city of Raleigh, this 3rd day of October, A. D., 1861. HENRY T. CLARK, Governor Elect. Oct. 5, 1861.
