THE BATTLE OF LEESBURG. A correspondent of the Richmond Dispatch relates

the following:-All battles and combats have their interesting incidents and hairbreadth escapes. I know of several in this. One incident I must relate be-

'In the God of Battles trust.' You are in a glorious cause—fight on, my brave

boys! fight on! and may the Lord have mercy upon you, and bring you off victorious." I will here venture an opinion, and belief, that these, with other pious ejaculations uttered by that good, pious whole-souled Southern gentleman, whose locks have been whitened by the frosts of three score years and ten, without disparagement, did as much, if not more, to encourage the men on the battle-field of Leesburg to deeds of heroism, and to urge them on from 'conquering to conquest," than did the General in command with all his military skill and ability. Such noble proofs and exhibitions of self-sacrificing heroism should be recorded, and with plea-

sure I chronicle the same.

Seriously, this idle and often cowardly circulation of alarming and sensational intelligence is a nuisance on our streets. Its reproduction in the papers adds infinitely to its mischief.

Richmond Examiner. The Tone of Bullets .- A soldier, writing from one of the camps on the Potomac, thus alludes to the peculiar music made by bullets passing through the air:

It is a very good place to exercise the mind, with the enemy's picket rattling close at hand. A musical ear can study the different tones of the bullets as they skim through the air. I caught the pitch of a large sized Minnie yesterday-it was a swell from E flat to F, and as it passed into the distance and lost its velocity, receded to D-a very pretty change. One of the most startling sounds is that produced by the Hotchkiss shell. It comes like the shriek of a demon, and the bravest old soldiers feel like ducking when they hear it. It is no more destructive than some other missiles, but there is a great deal in mere sound to work upon men's
