From the Charleston Courier. The North Garolina Coal-fields .- Editors Courier: - In looking over the proceedings of the Macon Convention, I noticed, among other resolutions passed, one suggesting the propriety and importance of opening up a communication with Granville-A. W. Venable, T. L. Hargrove, the Coal Fields of North Carolina. This is not a new idea. I desire to bring it to your notice that you might, if you think proper, bring it before the public, particularly the people of Charleston, who will be most benefited by it. The enter-prise is not a new one. The matter has been under consideration before, and two applications for charters, with a view to this connection, were before our Legislature as its last sitting—one for a road from Florence, S. C., to the line in the direction indicated, and if proper encouragement is given by the friends of the road in this State, there is scarcely a doubt that the road will be built from Fayetteville to the line. There is already a road from Fayetteville to the Coal Fields, I think, completed. I will not undertake to discuss the merits of the proposed plan,
