PROCLAMATION

By his Excellency Henry T. Clark, Governor of North Carolina.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,
RALEIGH, November 7, 1861.

In pursuance of the power vested in me by the 19th section of the Constitution, and by and with the advice of the Council of State, I do hereby prohibit the exportation beyond the limits of this State of all Bacon, Pork, Beef, Leather, Men's Shoes, Woven Goods, Jeans, Linseys and Blankets, &c., &c., except through the orders of the proper officers of the Confederate Government or of the State Governments. The Adjutant General will employ the necessary means to carry into full effect this order. All agents to purchase for the State are required to have written authority.
