A Noble Example.—Amidst the follies and sanguinary excesses of the Republicans of the French Revolution, it is impossible not to admire the energetic measures adopted against the foreign enemy. Europe had combined on the side of royalty. France was menaced on every side by their well trained armies, under leaders of reputation and experience. Her own people were divided, her ports blockaded—yet the preparations on the part of the French were such as no age or country had ever before witnessed. The capital, and every city in the empire, became at once an arsenal and a workshop for the armies. The Assignats compensated for the want of the precious metals, circulated in the name of the nation. They exhausted the treasuries of many of the crowned heads of Europe. All Frenchmen, by solemn decree, were declared to be at the service of the country, until the invaders were driven from the soil of France. The young men marched to meet the foe-the old men forged arms and provided provisions-the women fabricated tents and clothes, and attended the hospitals—the children made lint to dress the wounds of the patriots. At the very moment that the idea of a nation's rising "en masse" was ridiculed throughout Europe, the Convention, under the direction of Carnot, had created eleven distinct armies. Now for the result of this unexampled energy and patriotism.

The British historian of the time informs us that in seventeen months the French armies gained twenty-seven general battles, had been victorious in one hundred and twenty-seven actions, and had taken one hundred and sixteen strong cities and fortified places. These successes were obtained over the best disciplined armies in Europe, elated with their past triumphs over warlike enemies, and commanded by generals of great experience and most dazzling reputation, while the armies of the Republic consisted of officers and soldiers, few of whom had seen service, and commanded by generals hitherto without

Not content with driving every enemy from her soil, the population of the conquered countries which France acquired from her enemies, was estimated to amount to thirteen millions of souls. This period of French history affords us an instructive example. They contended for an absurd abstraction-we for a vital reality. Their watchword liberty, fraternity, equality-ours liberty, regulated by law. They fought and conquered a world in arms, for glory-a single nation threatens us with subjugation, and our homes and household gods with plunder and pollution. Let us emulate the heroism of the French. Richmond Whig.

Will you walk in, Mr. Fly?-The Yankee General, Buell, is reported to have issued a proclamation to the people of Tennessee, promising them all manner of good and gracious things, if they will lay down their arms and submit to be slaves. He does not use these precise wordsbut talks about allegiance and loyal subjects, &c., forgiveness for the past and respect for the future. But the language is intelligible enough. Only remain quiet until we Yankees can get the fetters upon you—that's all we ask.

Such proffers of grace and bounty are the bitterest and most humiliating insults that can be offered to a free people. That there may be some, who, from timidity or sordidness, may accept the degrading proffer, is likely enough; but no man who appreciates the precious blessing of freedom, and is worthy of it, will for a moment listen to the vile suggestion. Let it everywhere be met with war, stern, relentless, interminable war. Extermination is a thousand times preferable to such degradation. But if we meet them with becoming spirit, we shall visit the extermination upon them.—Richmond Whig.
