Fame, in its bad meaning, or one of its bad meanings, the same with Rumor, has been the subject of every poet's satire, who has had occasion to touch upon it. It is freequently treated as a person, and is most generally represented with a trumpet from which it blows forth lies to all the points of the compass. Virgil has given a full length portrait of it, which we subjoin, in Dryden's translation:

[NO. 1127.]

"The loud report through Lybian cities goes.
Fame the great ill, from small beginnings grows—
Swift from the first and every moment brings
New vigor to her flights, new pinions to her wings.
Soon grows the pigmy to gigantic size;
Her feet on earth, her forehead in the skies.
Enraged against the gods, revengeful Earth
Produced her last of the Titanian birth.
Swift is her walk, more swift her winged haste, Swift is her walk, more swift her winged haste, A monstrous phantom, horrible and vast. As many plumes as raise her lofty flight, So many piercing eyes enlarge her sight; Millions of opening mouths to fame belong,
And every mouth is furnished with a tongue,
And round with listening cars the flying plague is hung. She fills the peaceful universe with cries; No slumbers ever close her wakeful eyes; By day, from lofty towers her head she shews, And spreads through trembling crowds disastrous news. With court informers haunts, and royal spies;

Things done relates, not done she feigns, and mingles Talk is her business, and her chief delight To tell of prodigies and cause affright." Eneid 4th. The pigmy size of Rumor in its inception, the small beginnings in which it originates, its rapid growth and the portentous bulk to which it attains, is here set forth with equal spirit and accuracy. Every inhabitant, and every sojourner of this city, has had ample opportunities within the lastweek to verify the excellence of the portrait. There has been no end to the lies which Rumor . has been continually spreading from her iron trumpet. They are stuck to, too, with the most astonishing pertinacity. Smollett gives us an example of the manner in which Rumor dilates and expands as it moves along. It was reported that an old gentleman had vomited six black crows in a sudden spell of illness. The authority was given up. When appealed to, he said he had only mentioned three. It was traced back until it dwindled down to a single black crew. The investigator still did not give it up. He followed it until he came to the original propagator, who said he had only mentioned that the sick man had thrown up something as black as a crow. Rumor is like the mustard seed mentioned in Scripture, (if we may make the comparison, without irreverence.) It grows and expands into an enormous tree, that obscures the very light of the sun, by the time it is fairly planted. Most of our rumors come from persons ealing themselves couriers. Whether they are really such, we do not know. It is probable that some of them are, and that

finding everybody all agog for news, they merely

exercise what they regard as innocent ingenuity,

in testing their capacity for digestion. Others

are certainly not couriers. But every rumor by

whomsoever invented, is indebted for the size it

attains to each separate transmitter. A "courier'

tells some wonder-loving citizen that a skirmish

has been fought, in which the Yankees lost twelve

men. The citizen tells his neighbor, adding a

little to it. Each new hand adds his quota, until

at last the dozen swell to six thousand. Yankee

prisoners are no small hands at a rumor. From

them came, no doubt, that notable one which was

current a few days ago, that McClellan had pre-pared to throw 50,000 shells a minute into York,

when it was evacuated. As this is a fair example

by which to estimate the size to which a rumor may grow, we shall take the trouble to analyze it. The Yankee shells, they tell us, weigh about 200 pounds each. The gun that throws them weighs about 20,000 pounds. As both gun and shell are so heavy, we do not think the latter could be fired on an average oftener than twice a minute. To perform the feat indicated, therefore, it would require 25,000 cannon. As they are so heavy they could not be dragged into position by less than a dozen horses each, which would give 300,000 horses for the guns alone, leaving out the ammunition, which is no small item, since each shell must be fired by forty pounds of powder, making for shell and powder 240 pounds each, or for the whole 50,000 per minute, 12,000,000 per minute. Then it would take a dozen men to man each piece, or 300,000 men to man the whole 25,000. Suppose the bombardment to last an hour.
