A NIGHT ALARM: In his letter, dated 9th inst., "Personne," the correspondent of the Charleston Courier, gives the following entertaining account of camp scenes

at Corinth: A night alarm! What a flood of tumultuous emotions rush through the mind at the mere reminiscence! Whose pen can describe the vivid picture daguerreotyped upon the mental tablet? I fear me the task is beyond my poor reach. You are sitting quietly in your tent, say at ten o'clock in the evening. A calm day has merged into a beautiful night. The young moon sheds her silver lustre upon the surrounding scene. The sky is cloudless, and its myriad blossoms twinkle in their firmament alike on friend and foe. Your thoughts are far away-among those to whom your heart is "grappled as with hooks of steel." Suddenly—"Whish-sh-sh" shoots up a long golden serpent, streaming through the dark blue like a meteor, lingers for an instant in mid-air, then breaks into hery corruscations, and disagpears. It is a signal from one of the headquarters Few know its purport, but in a moment all realize its magic power. Like the touch upon the wonderful lamp of Aladdin, it calls into life a thousand varied scenes. The "long roll" rings its warning far and wide. Quick sharp commands echo through the woods. The country is now alive with passing couriers. Infantry, artillery and cavalry, that seem to have sprung from the earth, so quickly have they responded to the alarm, are moving in detachments to and fro, and the heavy tramp of men and beasts, the music of the regimental bands, the shrieks of life and rattle of drum, all tell of the sleeping monster aroused from his

lair. And your own feelings swell within you until they course like a torrent. Are the enemy advancing, or are we about to make an attack? Are the reverberating guns of the afternoon and the slow procession of the wounded, you saw passing, the precursors of the grand battle which forms the staple of every thought? Where will be our glorious army on to-morrow? Shall we conquer or be conquered? These and ten thousand others are the emotions that stir your whole nature, and you lay upon a sleepless couch to await the approach of daylight and its develop-

Morning comes, however, and with it all the peace of its predecessor. The alarm has proven talse. The day passes until the afternoon is reached. Again heavy cannonading is heard upon our right, and this time so distinctly that the bursting shells sound like the crack of a rifle. The windows rattle and the ground trembles with the ominous roar. Again there is commotion in the camps. The men are at their arms awaiting orders. Skirmishing is going on near our en-New Hanover-J.
