To guard against this difficulty, we publish the following directions, obtained from a gentleman who has been particularly successful in making

good wine. Express and strain the juice from ripe berries; let it stand in open vessels from 12 to 24 hours; good sugar to each gallon of juice, filling the barrel entirely full; leave the bunghole of the barrel open and keep it filled up, as long as it works over, then cork it and allow it to stand in a cool, dry place until next March, and you are sure to have

good wine. The wine should not be put into newly made barrels, as it will taste of the wood; and no water should be added to the juice.
