THE RETALIATION ORDER. THE SECRETARY of WAR having decided to come being the numerous Companies of Partizan Rangers into Battalions and Regiments for more effective service, as will join me; and desiring to enlarge my Battalion. I retaliation for the barbarities and cruelties proclaimed by Gen. Pope and others of the Yankee army. It is thought by some, to lack decision and vigor; others complain that it gives license to the brutal soldier whilst it holds officers to a strict account, thereby defeating the very end for which it was designed; whilst still a third party object that neither the order nor cartel for the exchange of prisoners affords the slightest protection to unoffending Confederate citizens living within the enemy's lines, and subject daily to every species of annoyance and persecution.

To take up the last objection first, we have been rather surprised that the government has not adopted some steps for the protection of its citizens and their property, embraced within the Federal lines. If it be possible, there is clearly an obligation on the government to do it and do it promptly. It would seem that whilst we had a large excess of prisoners in our hands, we might have made them available for that purpose, by demanding certain guaranties of the enemy before signing the articles of exchange, and, if refused, by holding a goodly number of prisoners as hostages for the good conduct of the Federals in the course of the war. It was a great oversight that something of this kind was not insisted on during the progress of negotiations. It might have secured peaceably that which may now cost a series of cruelties, at the very thought of which humanity must shudder. But these people must be protected at whatever cost. They owe our government allegiance, and have a right to insist that the correlative duty on its part shall be religiously performed. To abandon them

upon them, as well as an act of inhumanity. To the objections that the policy of our government lacks vigor, and exempts the private soldiers from its penalties, we have this to say: No doubt the feelings of every Southern man sympathize with that view of the case; yet we apprehend that the moderation of the President, when weighed in the balance of true wisdom and discretion, will be found to contain much to merit the public approval. A war of retaliation, especially under the circumstances of bitterness and revenge that characterize the present contest, is a fearful thing, and the extremest caution is to be observed lest a state of things be inaugurated that will shock the world with horror. Let us pause long and deliberate, well before we consent deliberately to take part in such a strife. We had rather favor the guilty enemy with our magnanimity than to have it said of us even that we took up the gauntlet when thrown down in such a strife, until every other resort had been tried in SALT PANS. Nor does the exemption of private soldiers by the order prevent a proper punishment of that class of our enemies whenever it may be called for by the circumstances of the case. Although a criminal part may be required of them by their others, it will be very easy to determine whether they exceeded in their severity the instructions of their superiors. Each case can be made to stand on its own merits, and punishment meted out according as it shall be deserved.

There is hardly any degree of rigor which the world would not justify us in visiting, when we have the power, upon our unprincipled foe. But the latitude granted by public opinion is not the true measure for a nation's conduct. It must act in such a way as will be best for its own people, Stolen from my stable near Lewisvillo, Forsyth in such a way as will be best for its own people, and at the same time elevate us most in the estimation of others and ourselves. The North has white saddle marks. No other marks recollected. Gait, conducted this war without the slightest regard to the usages of nations or the claims of humanity. Setting out with the principle that we are rebels, and not enemies, they outlaw us complete-

ly, and claim the right to deal with us as they please, without the slightest responsibility to publie opinion or the common law of nations. They do worse than this: they hold us as belligerents and enemies for all purposes where they have an 3 64 ment and conviction of the thief, and \$25 for the safe interest so to regard us—to get back their prisoners when we have twice as many as they, for instance-and deny us the character when it stands in the way of their schemes of cruelty and plunder. Thus they show their hypocrisy, in consistency and injustice-their total abandon ment of all principle, and disregard of public

opinion.

We hold, that as regards rights in this war, we stand on an equal footing in every respect with the enemy. We can do just anything and everything towards the Yankees that they can lawfully do towards us, and yet what would be thought of the leader of our armies if he went through Pennsylvania cramming the oath of allegiance to the Confederate government down the throats of the people of that Commonwealth, and driving them and their wives and children from their homes in the event they refused to take it? What would be thought of a Confederate commander if he should arrest and hang a prominent and valuable citizen of the same State for no other crime thau pointing out to his Yankee brethren in arms a convenient way of escape from the enemy? And yet these are rights claimed over our own people by our Yankee invaders, shamefully and in defiance of all enlightened public opinion.

These things are not to be borne, and if the remedy now sought to be applied should prove unavailing, we shall stand justified in resorting to measures of still greater severity.

The Murder of Gen. Caswell .- The Knoxville 'Register," of the 7th inst., gives but few additional particulars in regard to the murder of Gen. Wm. R. Caswell on the 6th instant, near his residence, some six miles east of Knoxville. His servants report that they saw him struggling with some one in the road, but before they could reach him life was extinct and the murderer fled. Gen. Caswell was a distinguished soldier, having served through the Mexican campaign. He was one of the earliest in Knoxville to embrace the cause of the South on the breaking out of the war. He was appointed by Gen. Harris a Brigadier General in the State service, and commanded the forces rendezvoused at Knoxville until they were turned over to the Confederate Government

when he retired to private life. Gen. C. was about 51 or 52 years of age, and was one of the most universally esteemed and respected citizens of Tennessee.
