A Wonderful Mirror.—Among the curiosities exhibited at the last Paris Exposition was a huge concave mirror, (which can be easily made anywhere,) to the preservation of fishes and meats. In the present condition of the salt market, a brief statement of the uses and value of Pyrogenous acid will be interesting to many readers of the Courier. We quote from the U. S. Dispensary:

"The crude acid is advantageously applied to preservation of animal food. Mr. William Ramsey (Edin. Phil. Jour., 111-21) makes some interesting experiments with it for that purpose. "Smellings and other fish singly dipped in the acid, and afterwards dried in the shade, were effectively preserved, and when eaten were found very agreeable to the taste. * * * Fresh beef dipped in the acid for a minute in summer, was perfectly sweet in the following spring."

"Prof. Stillman states that one quart of the acid added to the common pickle for a barrel of hams, at the time they are laid down, will impart the smoked flavor as perfectly as if they had undergone the ordinary process of smoking."

Is there not enterprise enough to begin the manufacture and use of this acid?
