will open her SCHOOL on Monday. s again that which it wore at the commencement spective resources for attack and defence, had not been tested, now the Southern armies stand once more upon the confines of the Northern territory,

flushed with victory, and elated with anticipation.

In regard to the mere area of territory now occupied by our forces, and to the extension of our military lines, we now stand in a better position than at any time since the beginning of the war. Contrasted with the situation of four months ago, the difference is so remarkable as to be, perhaps, unparalleled in the history of warfare. At that time Virginia was invaded by armies numbering, in the aggregate, 250,000 men, and the whole State north of James river. with the exception of a corner of the Southwest, which was offset by Federal conquests in the Southeast, was it possession of the enemy. His grand army, encamped within hearing of the bells of the Richmond churches, impatiently awaited the expected moment of a triumphal entry into the Confederate Capital. The whole of Kentucky was conquered; mere than half of Tennessee was given up to the invader; a great part of Arkansas was overrun, and Missouri appeared to have quietly submitted to the Federal yoke Even in Alabama and Mississippi and Louisiana, Yankee armies held sway over a great extent of country, and the unimpeded navigation of the Mississippi seemed to have been surrendered into Yankee hands. Now the whole of Virginia has been recovered, with the exception of Norfolk and Alexandria, and a small portion of the disatfected Northwest.
