EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,

RALEIGH, August 22, 1862.

THE Sheriffs and Constables of the different Counties of this State are hereby authorized and directed to arrest all persons belonging to the Confederate Army who are absent without leave.

For each arrest they will be entitled to reward from the Confederate Government of \$15 for each one confined in jail, or \$50 if delivered to the Camp of Instruction near Raleigh, or to a Confederate officer.

To secure these arrests the above named officers will call in any assistance, and use all the power and authority belonging to their said offices.
