

The actual yield is estimated at 459,410 hogsheads, averaging 1150 lbs., making an aggregate of 528,231,500 lbs. This embraced 330,264 hogsheads of brown sugar, made by the old process, and 70,146 refined, clarified, &c., the whole being the product of 1291 sugar houses, of which 102" were worked by steam, and 264 by horse power The crop of the preceding year amounted to 288, 756 hogsheads, weighing 268,065,015 pounds. showing an increase for the last year of \$30,657

hogsheads, or 265,266,500 pounds. According to our calculations the price of the entire crop has averaged 44c. against 52c. last year. At this average, and taking the estimate of 1,150 pounds to the hogshead, the aggregate value of the crop of 459,410 hogsheads is \$25, 095,291, against \$14,468,627, the product of 228, 753 hogsheads last year: or an increase of \$10, 626,645. The receipts of the Levee since the 1st of September have been 225,356 hogsheads, and 7,907 tierces and barrels, against 174,687 hogsheads and 5,978 tierces and barrels last year. The stock now on hand in this State is estimated at 170,000 howsheads.

The yield of molasses from the last year's cane crop is estimated at 70 gallons for each 1000 lbs of sugar, or an aggregate of 36,982,505 gallons, against 18,414,550 the year previous, showing an increase of 18,567,955 gallons, or more than as much again. Arrivals at the Levee during season have been 401,404 barrels against 313,260 last year, showing an increase of 88,944 barrels The total value of the product, estimated at an

Condition of General McClellan. - The correspondent of the New York Tribune writes of the condition of General McClellan:

The General Commanding the army of the Potomac looks worn and haggard. Through the afternoon he was prostrated with weariness; tonight he lies sick at Sharpsburg. Until this day, wherever he appeared the troops gave him uproarious welcome; you might trace his route through the camps by the resounding cheers. To-day, while he sat in his carriage, two entire corps passed by. There were a few faint cheers; but they were the veriest skeletons, the flitting ghost even, of the shouts of yesterday. The troops were on a double-quick; perhaps that was the reason.

Ducks in the Army .- A late sad affair, in which one officer fell by the hands of another in a duel, raises the inquiry whether it should not be laid down as a rule bereafter, that the officer who fights a duel shall lose his commission. Surely we have enemies enough on our front, without fighting each other; and a zealous opposition to them should serve to exhaust every feeling of resentment of which human nature is capable. One who endangers his life or that of a fellow-soldier. unnecessarily, does the work of an enemy, and should at least not wear a commission - Rich. Enquirer

Yankee Engines Safe - Five valuable locomotives, captured by the Confederates in the neighborhood of Warrenton and Manassas sometime since, reached Lynchburg last Friday over the Orange Railroad. Three of the five are uninjured, and the other two but slightly damaged. They are all of the best workmanship, of heavy capacity, and estimated to be worth in the present times of scarcity of machinery at least \$20,000 apiece. Extraordinary exertions were required to complete trestle work across the Rappahannock river, to admit the passage of these locomotives over the stream, and it was finished just in time to get them out of the way of the Yankees in their late raid to Warrenton. A number of cars have also been brought in safely across the Rappahanock.
