**Cotton and Sugar.**—The New Orleans Shipping List has been resumed. The cotton statement shows a beggarly account. The stock on the 29th August was 352 bales. The receipts during the year ending Sept. 1st, were 39,730 bales. Exported for the year, 27,205 bales. Burnt 2,200 bales. The statistics of the sugar crop of Louisiana are as follows:

The actual yield is estimated at 459,410 hogheads, averaging 1150 lbs., making an aggregate of 528,231,500 lbs. This embraces 339,234 hogheads of brown sugar, made by the old process, and 70,176 refined, clarified, &c., the whole being the product of 1291 sugar houses, of which 1027 were worked by steam, and 264 by horse power. The crop of the preceding year amounted to 288,753 hogheads, weighing 268,065,915 pounds, showing an increase for the last year of 839,657 hogheads, or 265,266,500 pounds.

According to our calculations the price of the entire crop has averaged 4½c against 5½c last year. At this average, and taking the estimate of 1,150 pounds to the hoghead, the aggregate value of the crop of 459,410 hogheads is \$25,992,291, against \$14,468,627, the product of 228,753 hogheads last year; or an increase of \$11,626,645. The receipts of the Levee since the 1st of September have been 235,356 hogheads, and 7,907 tierces and barrels, against 174,637 hogheads and 5,975 tierces and barrels last year. The stock now on hand in this State is estimated at 170,000 hogheads.

The yield of molasses from the last year's crop is estimated at 70 gallons for each 1000 lbs of sugar, or an aggregate of 36,982,505 gallons, against 18,414,550 the year previous, showing an increase of 18,567,955 gallons, or more than as much again. Arrivals at the Levee during last year have been 401,404 barrels against 313,200 last year, showing an increase of 88,944 barrels.

The total value of the product, estimated at an average of 184 cents per gallon, sums up \$6,703,079 against \$4,235,446 last year, showing an increase of \$2,467,733.
