stimulant. American Gentian-Blue Gentian or Sampon Snake Root, is one of the purest tonics in the vegetable kingdom. It grows in grassy swamps and on the edges of roads, and blossoms from Sep tember to December. As a medicine it is little, if at all, interior to the European Gentian. It excites the appetite, invigorates the powers of digestion, and is much esteemed as a medicine in dyspepsia. It is well known to us-its flowers are of palish blue and bell shaped, and is one of the most beautiful plants in the Southern country. The root is the part used, and may be collected

during the fall and winter months. Canada Snake Root-Wild Ginger .- This plant is found in woods and shady places, as far South as Carolina. It is aromatic, stimulant and tonic, and may be well employed as a substitute for ginger; all parts of the plant have a grateful aromatic odor, and more powerful in the root, which is the part used. It also possesses diaphoretic properties, and is sometimes used by the country people as a substitute for ginger. It is an admirable adjunct to tonic infusions and de-
