WEST POINT SOLDIERS

The following particulars of the history of prominent officers of the Confederate and United States graduates at the Military Academy at West Point, are believed to be reliable. Up to 1860, the facts stated are taken from the Register of that institution, compiled in that year. A short explanation will enable the reader to understand the statements.

Each cadet after graduating is entitled to the rank of 2d Lieutenant, his commission bearing date according to his proficiency in his studies, in drill, &c. The discipline and standard of scholarship are very high, as may be inferred from the fact that, on an average, about two-thirds of the cadets who enter the Academy are dropped in the four years' course, from ill health, bad conduct, laziness or inability to keep pace with their more able classmates, leaving about one-third only to finish their course and attain the rank of 2d Lieutenant in the regular army.

CLASS OF 1825—37 GRADUATES. Samuel Cooper, of N. Y., entered artillery, 1st Colonel for gallant conduct in Mexico; compiler of a work on Tactics; Adj. Gen. U. S. A. NOTE—Charles Davies, author of "Legend," "Bourdon," &c., was a member of this class.

CLASS OF 1826—40 MEMBERS. Richard Delahfield, of N. Y., No. 1, entered Engineers; member of board of Engineers since 1845. NOTE—Majors Delahfield, Mordecai and McClellan were appointed to visit Europe during the Crimean war, and report upon the military system of the Allies and Russians. Major D. now has charge of the Harbor defenses of N. Y. City.
