No. IV -FOOD. 1. Preserving Meat Without Salt.-We need

salt as a relish to our food, but it is not essential

to the preservation of our meats. The Indians

used little or no salt, yet they preserved meat and

even fish in abundance by drying. This can be

accomplished by fire, by smoke or by sunshine;

but the most rapid and reliable mode is by all of

these agents combined. To do this select a spot

having fullest command of sunshine. Erect there

a wigwam five or six feet high, with an open top,

in size proportioned to the quantity of meat to be

cured, and protected from the winds so that all

the smoke must pass through the open top. The

meat cut into pieces suitable for drying (the thin

ner the better) is to be suspended on rods in the

open comb, and a vigorous smoke made of half

decayed wood, is to be kept up without cessation.

shine, heat and smoke, meat cut into slices not

Commandants of conscripts will cause the following order to be published for at least seven times in a suffi-cient number of newspapers in each State of the Confederacy to ensure its reaching every part of the country: I. All commissioned officers and enlisted men who are now absent from their commands from any other causes than actual disability, or duty under orders from the Sec'y of War, or from their department commanders,

will return to their commands without delay. II. Commissioned officers failing to comply with the provisions of the foregoing paragraph within a reasonable length of time, in no case to exceed twenty days after the publication of this order, shall be dropped from the rolls of the army in disgrace, and their names will be furnished to the commandant of conscripts for en-

istment in the ranks. III. All enlisted men who shall fail to comply with he provisions of paragraph I, of this order, within a reasonable length of time, shall be considered as desertrs. and treated accordingly, their names to be furnished to the commandant of conscripts, in their State, for publication, or such other action as may be deemed most efficacious.

IV. In order to ensure the efficient co-operation of all oncerned to carry this order into immediate effect, Department Commanders are directed to require from the commanding officer of each separate command in their their commands. These reports must state in each case the cause of absence, and any regimental, battalion or MARY M. STARR, Executrix. company commander who shall neglect to furnish such a report, or who shall knowingly be guilty of concealing any case of unauthorized absence, shall, on conviction thereof, be summarily dismissed.

V. Under the provisions of 2d clause of paragraph 1: of General Orders No. 32, commissioned officers and privates who are incapable of bearing arms in consejuence of wounds received in battle, but who are otherwise fit for service, are required, if not otherwise assigned, to report to the nearest commandant of conscripts in their respective States, who will, if they are fitted for uch duty, assign them to the collection of stragglers and the enforcement of the provisions of this order. with full power to call upon the nearest military authority for such assistance as may be necessary thereto. V1. Officers of the Quartermaster's Department, charged with payment of troops, are hereby directed not to pay any commissioned officer, non-commissioned officer r private who does not furnish satisfactory evidence that he is not liable to the penalties described in the foregoing order. Any disbursing officer who shall make payment in violation of this order shall be liable on his and for the amount of such payment.



A much more manageable form of rice flour. than the bolted, can be produced by pounding in an ordinary mortar. The rice grain must be softventive of clamminess.

10. Corn Meal and Bread .- Any field negro in the South can make better corn bread than can be found in Northern hotels. The simpler the process the better the bread, The only art 200 lbs. Gum Arabic for sale by J. R. LEE. practiced by the negro is in mixing well, and in allowing his dough to stand half an hour before baking; it is then in the incipient stage of the saccharine fermentation. Corn dough, allowed to stand over night, will rise without yeast.
