WEST POINT SOLDIERS.

The following particulars of the history of prominent officers of the Confederate and United States, graduates at the Military Academy at West Point, are believed to be reliable. Up to 1850, the facts stated are taken from the Register of that institution, compiled in that year. A short explanation will enable the reader to understand the statements.

Each cadet after graduating is entitled to the rank of 2d Lieutenant, his commission bearing date according to his proficiency in his studies, in drill, &c. The discipline and standard of scholarship are very high, as may be inferred from the fact that, on an average, about two-thirds of the cadets who enter the Academy are dropped in the four years' course, from ill health, bad conduct, laziness or inability to keep pace with their more able classmates, leaving about one-third only to finish their course and attain the rank of 2d Lieutenant in the regular army. A graduate attaining high distinction in his class, must possess not only fine mental endowments, but physical dexterity and vigor, and habits of punctuality. The numbers in the subjoined compilation denote the respective class rank—No. 1 being highest, No. 2 next, and so on; the first five being regarded as peculiarly distinguished, while those having lower numbers must be highly accomplished officers—much more thoroughly educated than are usually the graduates of other Colleges. The class rank was adopted in 1818. It is interesting to notice in what cases "age has performed the promises of youth."

CLASS OF 1815. Samuel Cooper, of N. Y., entered Artillery; Lt Colonel for gallant conduct in Mexico; compiler of a work on Tactics; Adj Gen C S A. NOTE—Charles Davies, author of "Legendre," "Bourdon," &c. was a member of this class.

CLASS OF 1818—23 MEMBERS. Richard Delafield, of N. Y., No. 1, entered Engineers; member of Board of Engineers since 1845. NOTE—Majors Delafield, Mordecai and McCellan have been appointed to visit Europe during the Crimean war, and report upon the military system of the Allies and Russians. Major D. now has charge of the Harbor defences of N. Y. City.

CLASS OF 1819—29 MEMBERS. Harvey Brown, of N. J., No. 6, entered Light Artillery; Brevet Major for gallantry in the Seminole war, 1836; Brevet Lt Col at Contreras and Churubusco; now Col commanding Fort Pickens.

CLASS OF 1820—30 MEMBERS. John W. Whistler, of N. Y., No. 1, entered Artillery; Brevet Major 1847; for gallantry at Contreras and Churubusco; Brig Gen C S A.

CLASS OF 1822—40 MEMBERS. J. F. Mansfield, of Connecticut, No. 2, brevet Major for gallantry at Fort Brown, Texas, in 1846; wounded severely in storming Monterey and was brevetted Lieutenant Colonel, and Colonel for gallantry at Buena Vista; Chief Engineer of Genl Taylor's army; member of Board of Engineers, now Major General, U S A.

CLASS OF 1824—31 MEMBERS. Alfred Mordecai, of North Carolina, was No. 1 in this class.

CLASS OF 1825—37 GRADUATES. Daniel S. Donelson, of Tenn, No. 5, entered Artillery; resigned 1826; counsellor at law; planter in Ala, since 18, Brig General C S A.

CLASS OF 1826—40 MEMBERS. Albert Sidney Johnston, born in Ky, cadet from Ala, was No. 8, entered the infantry service in "Black Hawk" war as assistant Adjutant General; resigned 1834; Secretary of war of Texas, 1835; Colonel of 1st Regiment Texas Volunteers in war with Mexico; re-appointed Paymaster U S Army 1849; command led the Utah expedition; General C S A; killed at Shiloh.

CLASS OF 1827—38 MEMBERS. James A. J. Bradford, born in Tenn, cadet from Ky, No. 4, entered Artillery; member of N C military board; Colonel of Ordnance C S A.

CLASS OF 1828—41 MEMBERS. Leonidas Polk, of N. C., No. 8, entered Artillery; resigned 1827; Bishop of La, 1841; now Major General C S A.

CLASS OF 1829—45 MEMBERS. Gabriel J. Rains, cadet from N. C., No. 13, entered infantry; wounded at Fort King, Fla, and brevetted Major for gallant conduct; now Brigadier General C S A.

CLASS OF 1830—42 GRADUATES. Wm N. Pendleton, cadet from Va, No. 5, entered Artillery; resigned 1833; Prof in Bristol and Delaware College, 1833-38; Clergyman Protestant Episcopal Church since 1837; now Brig General C S A.

CLASS OF 1831—32 GRADUATES. Samuel R. Curtis, of Ohio, No. 27, entered infantry; resigned 1832; Civil Engineer for many years; Counsellor at Law; Colonel of 3rd Ohio volunteers in Mexican war; member of U S House of Representatives; now Brig General C S A.

CLASS OF 1832—45 MEMBERS. Erasmus D. Keys, born in Mass, cadet from Maine, No. 10, entered Artillery; Aid de Camp to Gen. Scott 1837, now Brig Genl U S A.

CLASS OF 1833—43 GRADUATES. George W. Cullum, born in N. Y., cadet from Pa, No. 3, entered Engineers; commandant of Sappers, Miners and Pontonniers 1848; author of a work on "Military Bridges," &c; Brig General U S A.

CLASS OF 1834—46 MEMBERS. Joseph R. Anderson, of Va, No. 4, entered Artillery; transferred to Engineers 1836, resigned 1837; Civil Engineer 1838-41; superintendent of Tredgair Iron Works 1841; Brig General C S A, resigned.

CLASS OF 1835—50 MEMBERS. George Meade, born in Spain, cadet from Pa, No. 19, joined artillery, resigned 1836; re-appointed 2d Lieut Topog Engineers 1842; brevet 1st Lieutenant for gallantry at Monterey; now Brig General U S A.

CLASS OF 1836—49 MEMBERS. Joseph R. Anderson, of Va, No. 4, entered Artillery; transferred to Engineers 1836, resigned 1837; Civil Engineer 1838-41; superintendent of Tredgair Iron Works 1841; Brig General C S A, resigned.

CLASS OF 1837—50 MEMBERS. Henry W. Benham, of Conn, No. 1, entered Engineers; wounded and brevetted Capt for gallantry at Buena Vista; Brig Gen U S A. Dismissed Braxton Bragg, of N. C., No. 5, entered Artillery; Brevetted Captain for gallantry at Buena Vista; now General C S A.

CLASS OF 1838—48 GRADUATES. Philip St. George Cooke, of Va, No. 23, entered Infantry; Major Dragoons 1847; Brevet Lieut Col.

Major 1st Regiment Va Volunteers in Mexican war; now Brig General U S A. John C. Pendleton, of Pa, No. 27, entered Artillery; brevet Captain for gallantry at Monterey; brevet Major for gallantry at Molino del Rey; now Brig General C S A.

Joseph Hooker, of Mass, No. 29, entered Artillery; brevet Captain for gallantry at Monterey; brevet Major at the National Bridge; brevet Lt Col at Chapultepec; now Maj Genl U S A.

Arnold Elzy, graduated as Arnold E. Jones, of Md, No. 33, entered Artillery; Brevet Captain for gallantry at Contreras and Churubusco; now Brig General C S A.

Wm H. T. Walker, of Ga, No. 46, entered infantry; severely wounded in the battle of Okechoeche, Fla, brevet 1st Lieutenant for gallantry in Seminole war, resigned 1833; re-appointed; Brevet Major at Contreras and Churubusco; severely wounded at Molino del Rey; Brevet Lieut Col at Molino del Rey; Brig General C S A; resigned; now General in army of Ga.

CLASS OF 1839—45 MEMBERS. P. G. T. Beauregard, of La, No. 2, entered Artillery; 2d Lt Engineers 1839; Brevet Captain for gallantry at Contreras and Churubusco; Brevet Major at Chapultepec; wounded at the Belen gate in entering City of Mexico; now General C S A.

James H. Trapner, of S. O., No. 8, entered Artillery, 1st Lt Engineers 1839; resigned 1848; planter since 1849; now Brig Genl U S A.

Irvin McDowell, of Ohio, No. 25, entered Artillery; Brevt Capt for gallantry at Buena Vista; now Maj Genl U S A.

William J. Hardee, of Ga, No. 26, entered Dragoons; Brevet Major for gallantry at Medina, (near Vera Cruz); Brevt Lt Col at San Augustine; now Major Genl U S A.

Henry H. Sibley, La, No. 31, Brevt Major for gallantry at Medina; now Maj Genl U S A.

Kidward Johnson, of Ky, No. 32, entered Infantry; Brevt Capt for gallantry at Molino del Rey; now Brig Genl U S A.

Henry W. Halleck, of N. Y., No. 3, entered Engineers; Author of a work on "Bittumen" and of "Elements of Military Art and Science;" Brevt Capt for gallantry in California; Secretary of State of California; Counsellor at Law; now commanding General U S A.

Jeremy F. Gilmer, of N. C., No. 4, entered Engineers; now Colonel Engineers C S A.

Alexander R. Lawton, of S. C., No. 15, entered Artillery; resigned 1840; Lawyer at Savannah since 1840; President Savannah and Augusta R R since 1848; now Brig General C S A.

R. James S. Ricketts, of N. Y., No. 16, entered Artillery; now Brig General U S A.

Edward R. S. Cady, born in Ky, cadet from Indiana, No. 30, Brevet Major for gallantry at Contreras and Churubusco; now Brig General U S A.

CLASS OF 1840—42 MEMBERS. Paul O. Hebert, of La, No. 1, entered Engineers; resigned 1840; Chief Engineer of State of La, 1846-47; reappointed Lieut Colonel Infantry 1847; Brevet Colonel for gallantry at Molino del Rey; dismissed 1848; now Brig General C S A.

Reuben P. Campbell, of N. C., No. 27, entered Dragoons; Brevet Captain for gallantry at Buena Vista, Cal C S A, killed at Chickamauga.

Thomas Jordan, of Va, No. 41, entered Infantry; now Brig General C S A.
