HEADQUARTERS CAMP OF INSTRUCTION,
CAMP HOLMES, December 1, 1862.

IN accordance with instructions from the Secretary of War the following General Order No. 96 is published. The Enrolling Officers of this State will pay particular attention to the same and report to these Headquarters all officers and enlisted men who do not comply promptly with said Order.

RICHMOND, Nov'r 27, 1862.

(GENERAL ORDERS, No. 96.)
Commanding Officers will cause the following order to be published for at least seven times in a sufficient number of newspapers in each State of the Confederacy to ensure its reaching every part of the country:
I. All commissioned officers and enlisted men who are absent from their commands from any other cause than actual disability, or duty under orders from the Sec'y of War, or from their department commanders, will return to their commands without delay.
II. Commissioned officers failing to comply with the provisions of the foregoing paragraph within a reasonable length of time, in no case to exceed twenty days after the publication of this order, shall be dropped from the rolls of the army in disgrace, and their names will be furnished to the commanding officer of conscripts for enlistment in the ranks.
III. All enlisted men who shall fail to comply with the provisions of paragraph 11 of this order, within a reasonable length of time, shall be considered as deserters, and treated accordingly, their names to be furnished to the commanding officer of conscripts, in their State, for publication, or such other action as may be deemed most efficacious.

IV. In order to ensure the efficient co-operation of all concerned to carry this order into immediate effect, the Department Commanders are directed to require from the commanding officer of each separate command in their Department a prompt report of the names of all commissioned officers and enlisted men who are absent from their commands. These reports must state in each case the cause of absence, and any regimental, battalion or company commander who shall neglect to furnish such a report, or who shall knowingly be guilty of concealing any case of unauthorized absence, shall, on conviction thereof, be summarily dismissed.
V. Under the provisions of 24 clause of paragraph 1 of General Order No. 82, commissioned officers and private fighters who are incapable of bearing arms in consequence of wounds received in battle, but who are otherwise fit for service, are required, if not otherwise assigned, to report to the nearest commanding officer of conscripts in their respective States, who will, if they are fitted for such duty, assign them to the collection of stragglers and the enforcement of the provisions of this order, with full power to call upon the nearest military authority for such assistance as may be necessary thereto.
VI. Officers of the Quartermaster's Department, charged with the duty of furnishing subsistence and pay to any commissioned officer, non-commissioned officer or private who does not furnish satisfactory evidence that he is not liable to the penalties described in the foregoing order. Any disbursing officer who shall make payment in violation of this order shall be liable on his bond for the amount of such payment.

Special Orders, No. 12.
COMMISSARIUS OFFICERS of Militia Regiments I. are required to assemble all persons subject to the provisions of the act entitled "an act to amend an act entitled an act to provide further for the public defence," approved Sept. 20, 1862, and enroll the same. II. An Enrolling Officer of the Militia Regiments will be appointed for each Congressional District, who will give due notice to the commanding officers of Regiments to bring the conscripts to the County Seats of their respective Counties for examination. Immediately upon the receipt of the said Commanding Officers of Regiments will conduct all conscripts not having received certificate of exemption, to the Camp of Instruction, near Raleigh.
III. All persons who may desire to volunteer must do so before the 20th of December, the day set apart for enrollment, and must join Companies which were in the service of the Confederate States on the 15th of April 1862.
IV. Applications for exemption, must, in all cases, be made to the enrolling officer of the district, duplicate copies of said application being made in writing, duly sworn to before a acting Justice of the Peace and bearing the certificate of the Clerk of the Court, given under the provisions of the act entitled "an act to amend an act to provide further for the public defence," approved Sept. 20, 1862, and sent through the respective County Seats to the Colonel of the Regiments. An appeal may be taken from the decision of the enrolling officer to the Commandant of Conscripts. V. All conscripts engaged on Government works will be enrolled and returned to their said work.
In issuing the above orders for the enrollment of Conscripts the undersigned officer of the district, duplicate copies of said application being made in writing, duly sworn to before a acting Justice of the Peace and bearing the certificate of the Clerk of the Court, given under the provisions of the act entitled "an act to amend an act to provide further for the public defence," approved Sept. 20, 1862, and sent through the respective County Seats to the Colonel of the Regiments. An appeal may be taken from the decision of the enrolling officer to the Commandant of Conscripts. V. All conscripts engaged on Government works will be enrolled and returned to their said work.

HONOR TO WHOM HONOR IS DUE.
Extracts from a sermon delivered at Christ Church, Savannah, on Thursday, September 18th, 1862, being Thanksgiving Day, by the Right Rev. Stephen Elliott, Bishop of Georgia.

WOMAN'S HEROISM.
The attitude of woman is sublime. Bearing all the sacrifices of which I have just spoken, she is moreover called upon to suffer in her affections, to be wounded and smitten where she feels deepest and most enduringly. Man goes to the battle field, but woman sends him there, even though her heart-string tremble while she gives the farewell kiss and the farewell blessing. Man is supported by the necessity of movement, by the excitement of action, by the hope of honor, by the glory of conquest. Woman remains at home to suffer, to bear the cruel torture of suspense, to tremble when the battle has been fought and the news of the slaughter is flashing over the electric wire, to know that defeat will cover her with dishonor and her little one with ruin, to learn that the husband she deoted upon, the son whom she cherished in her bosom and upon whom she never let the wind blow too rudely, the brother with whom she sported through all her happy days of childhood, the lover to whom her early vows were pledged, has died upon some distant battle-field and lies there a mangled corpse, unknown and uncared for, never to be seen again even in death! Oh! those fearful lists of the wounded and the dead! How carelessly we pass them over, unless our own loved ones happen to be linked with them in military association, and yet each name in that roll of slaughter carries a fatal pang to some woman's heart—some noble, devoted woman's heart. But she bears it all and bows submissive to his country. He died for the entire. He perished for his country. I would not have it any otherwise, but I should like to have given the dying boy my blessing, the expiring husband my kiss of affection, the bleeding lover the comfort of knowing that I knelt beside him!

"And when we turn to our armies, truly these victories are the victories of the private. God
