CAMP OF THE 52D -N. C. REGIMENT,

Near Franklin, Va., Dec. 18, 1862. Messrs. Editors: After our Regiment, (the 52d N. C.) was organized at Camp Mangum the 1st of last April, and drilled there near two months, we left and went to Kinston, N. C: From there. we went to Drury's Bluff, Va; from there to Camp French near Petersburg; and from there to Camp Vance, near Franklin. All these removals have been accomplished in eight months; and during this time, I have been a strict observer of the difference made by the people between the officers and the privates and non-commissioned officers. I do not wish to be understood, that there is too much respect paid the officers, but I do think, privates are frequently treated too coldly by persons at least where officers pay visits occasionally. They seem to think that if a man has one, two, or three stripes of gold-lace upon his collar, that he is of the pure material. But if a private visits or happens to get in company with these non-combatants, they are apt to treat him with indifference, because he has not a fine gray coat with the sleeves decorated in a zigzag fashion, and one, two or three stripes of gold lace upon his collar, but is clad in coarse, and sometimes dirty and ragged clothing. They seem to forget, that while the officers' pay ranges from 80 to 140 dollars per month, the poor privates get the pittful sum of eleven dollars. admit that in the ranks are found all sorts of characters, but no one would suppose for a moment, that every true patriot, every intelligent, moral, and respectable gentleman has an office in the Southern Armies: If they did, the number of officers would very near equal the number of privates, but this is not so; therefore in the ranks of our armies are to be found intelligent and good citizens who were gentlemen at home, and highly respected as such. There, also, are young men of talent and good parentage, who crowd the ranks of our armies. The colleges have very near all been suspended, and the young men who were there preparing themselves for usefulness in life, have shouldered their muskets and are now standing up in the defence of their homes.
