AN ORDINANCE to amend an Ordinance entitled an Ordinance to revive and amend an Ordinance to regulate the Market.
It is ordained by the Mayor and Commissioners of the Town of Fayetteville, and it is hereby established to the authority of the same, That the under part of the Town House is ordained and established the market place for said Town, subject to the following Rules and Regulations, or such other as may be from time to time adopted by the Board of Commissioners for that purpose.
1. There shall be a Clerk for the Market appointed, with such a salary as shall be a reasonable compensation for his services, and the Mayor whenever he may deem it necessary, shall appoint at his discretion any number of Assessors, whose duty it shall be to attend every morning from the first day of April until the first day of October until eight and a half o'clock, and on the first day of October until the first day of April until 9 o'clock, and who shall be vested with the authority of a Constable and whose further duty it shall be to see that such rules and regulations as aforesaid may hereafter be established for the regulation of the market be duly observed, to keep the market clean; to superintend the weights and measures; shall call out the amount of any article that he or they may be required to do, either by the Mayor or Assessor, (in case of dispute) shall see that such articles as are exposed for sale in the market are of good and wholesome quality; shall see that no unfairness is practiced; that all who have business at the market-place, either as buyers or sellers, have an equal chance to the market.
2. All such articles as are usually brought to market, for the ordinary and daily consumption of the inhabitants, to wit: Fresh pork, beef, mutton, veal, venison, poultry of all kinds, fish, cheese, butter and eggs, (except in small quantities or carts or on horses, shall be exposed or offered for sale at the market place, or within the market square, until after seven and a half o'clock A. M. from 1st April to 1st October, and until after 8 o'clock A. M. from 1st Oct. to 1st April; and any person who shall buy any of the aforesaid articles, contrary to the true intent and meaning of this law, within the limits of Fayetteville, (Lower Fayetteville excepted) shall forfeit and pay the sum of five dollars for each and every offence, to be recovered by any person offering for sale in open market any article of a bad or unwholesome quality, or who shall sell any article by a false weight or measure, shall forfeit and pay the sum of five dollars for each and every offence.
3. The butchers belonging to the Town may in their option lease stalls for their exclusive use, but in case all the stalls should be taken up, any of them so leased (unoccupied by the persons leasing) shall be free for the use of any other person: Provided always, That such temporary occupant shall give them up to the person leasing, when required, and in such orders as they found them.
4. The Clerk of the Market shall collect from those persons who shall sell meat in the market, and have not leased a stall, — for each beef, 40 cts; for each hog, mutton or other small carcase, 10 cts. And no person shall be subject to any charge for any other article sold in market, whether by weight or measure, or for the use of all persons whatever, belonging to either town or country.
5. That one of the stalls shall be kept entirely for the use of such of the country people as bring meat for the same. From the Minutes.

M. from 1st Oct. to 1st April; and any person who shall buy any of the aforesaid articles, contrary to the true intent and meaning of this law, within the limits of Fayetteville, (Lower Fayetteville excepted) shall forfeit and pay the sum of five dollars for each and every offence, to be recovered by any person offering for sale in open market any article of a bad or unwholesome quality, or who shall sell any article by a false weight or measure, shall forfeit and pay the sum of five dollars for each and every offence.
3. The butchers belonging to the Town may in their option lease stalls for their exclusive use, but in case all the stalls should be taken up, any of them so leased (unoccupied by the persons leasing) shall be free for the use of any other person: Provided always, That such temporary occupant shall give them up to the person leasing, when required, and in such orders as they found them.
4. The Clerk of the Market shall collect from those persons who shall sell meat in the market, and have not leased a stall, — for each beef, 40 cts; for each hog, mutton or other small carcase, 10 cts. And no person shall be subject to any charge for any other article sold in market, whether by weight or measure, or for the use of all persons whatever, belonging to either town or country.
5. That one of the stalls shall be kept entirely for the use of such of the country people as bring meat for the same. From the Minutes.

There shall be a Clerk for the Market appointed, with such a salary as shall be a reasonable compensation for his services, and the Mayor whenever he may deem it necessary, shall appoint at his discretion any number of Assessors, whose duty it shall be to attend every morning from the first day of April until the first day of October until eight and a half o'clock, and on the first day of October until the first day of April until 9 o'clock, and who shall be vested with the authority of a Constable and whose further duty it shall be to see that such rules and regulations as aforesaid may hereafter be established for the regulation of the market be duly observed, to keep the market clean; to superintend the weights and measures; shall call out the amount of any article that he or they may be required to do, either by the Mayor or Assessor, (in case of dispute) shall see that such articles as are exposed for sale in the market are of good and wholesome quality; shall see that no unfairness is practiced; that all who have business at the market-place, either as buyers or sellers, have an equal chance to the market.
2. All such articles as are usually brought to market, for the ordinary and daily consumption of the inhabitants, to wit: Fresh pork, beef, mutton, veal, venison, poultry of all kinds, fish, cheese, butter and eggs, (except in small quantities or carts or on horses, shall be exposed or offered for sale at the market place, or within the market square, until after seven and a half o'clock A. M. from 1st April to 1st October, and until after 8 o'clock A.
