The Charleston and Savannah road, and the Charleston and Northeastern road, were just completed when the war broke out, and with certain lateral lines in other States, are in good conflition, but with these exceptions, the condition of the Railroads in the Confederate States is of a character to excite the serious concern, and call for prompt action, both of the government and the people.

If some other plan should not be adopted, it may become accessary for the companies owning the lines chiefly used by the government, to buy the iron, locomotives and cars on the branch roads, in order to repair their tracks and keep up their rolling stock. The government itself may intervene, and require the parties to come into such an arrangement.
