The Church burning in Florida-A Scene. -A letter from Jacksonville, Fla., gives an account of the scene which tollowed the barbarous burning of the Catholic Church there by the 8th

Maine Reg't, from the land of convent burning mobs and "Hiss" inquisition committees. It says: The two Irish companies having been sent out of the way on purpose, the Maine regiment marched up to the Church, and, after glutting their beastly minds by desecrating the house of God, cutting and detacing the sacred symbols of religion, set fire to the building, destroying every-

same fate. Nought was respected, nothing saved. The news of these outrages having reached the Irish companies, they rushed to the scene of wanton destruction, but too late to save. Many actually wept because of their inability to do any Then, filled with bate at the doers of this mischief, and unmindful-of the disparity of numbers, they turned upon the Down Easters, when a fierce street fight ensued, which could only be quelled by the ordering out of the entire Yankee force, whose united efforts were necessary to

disarm the two companies. The Irishmen were carried on board the gun-5 00 boats in irons, still defiant, and swearing yet to wreak an ample vengeance upon the slab-sided sons of Maine. An Irish officer assured me he and his men were amply punished for fraternizing so oo and fighting with such dastards as these Yankees, 2 50 and although new in a minority, they would yet 8 50 land where other Irish troops would hear their story, and the fight would be renewed until satisfaction was had.

Rust in Wheat .- It has been long known and the idea acted on among the Spanish agricultur-6 60 ists in Texas and Mexico, that the rust in wheat 3 00 is produced by showers of heavy dews followed by a hot sun, during that period of vegetation when the wheat is in bloom and milk. The effect of the sun upon the wet plant produces the rust. To 4 00 avoid this result, two men take a heavy rope, say 5 00 twenty or thirty feet long, or longer, and walking 8econd Class or Deck Passengers must stay on at that distance apart, draw it over the wet grain, thereby shaking off the drops of rain or dew, and thus prevent the usual effect of the sun upon the plant. After a heavy dew the rope should be drawn over the wheat early in the morning. Wheat planted on hitls or in windy positions, generally escapes rust; when in low, flat ground, where there is less wind, the rust takes effect. Smut is probably produced in the same manner.

The Value of Paper .- A slashing pamphlet, by Col. Blanton Duncan, of which Mr. Memminger is the subject and victim, has reached us by mail. It refers to transactions between them in the business of engraving Treasury notes, and is so serious in its accusations, and so sharp in its phraseology, that but for the serene attitude of the Sec'y, we should fear that his composure had been disturbed by it. A novel opinion of that functionary is developed by the publication of a note bearing date October 1861, viz: "Without paper," says Mr Memminger, "we cannot print Treasury notes, and without them the Government must stop. What a blessed thing is paper! We knew that we had been in danger from want of men, of arms, of ammunition, and of supplies-but it seems the great, though unknown, danger was want of paper! Let us be thankful that we had a Secretary who appreciated this vital peril and guarded against
