impressments by officers of the army."

The Confederate States of America de enact. That in appraisement to be fair and just, endorse upon it his approval; if not, he shall endorse upon it his reasons for refusing, and deliver the same, with a receipt for the properly impressed, to the owner, his agent or attorney, and as soon as practicable, forward a copy of the receipt and appraisement, and his endorsement thereon, to the board of appraisers appointed by the President and Governor of the State, who shall revise the same and make a final valuation, so as to give just compensation for the property taken, which valuation shall be paid by the proper department, for the use of which the property was taken, on the certificate of the appraisars,

Tunneling the Alps .- TURIN, ITALY, March 30.-The great engineering enterprise of tunneling the Alps has been some five years in progress, and the distance penetrated, including the operations on both sides, is only about one mile, leaving eleven more to be bored! But the calculations of Mr. Fell, the English engineer, who has this Alpine work in charge, are that, although he has accomplished but one mile in five years, he will be able, by his improved machinery, to com, have now on hand sizes running from 18X23 inches to plete the remaining distance of eleven miles, in ten years. About forty agents, divided into two brigades, one turning to the north and the other to the south of the Alps, under the leadership of two engineers, have during the four n onths explored the mountain, and traced the plan of the future railway which is to pass over rocks, cross torrents, fill up the valleys, gorges, and precipices, before which science does not hesitate. The stimulus of having a great work to accomplish has alone sustained the picked men to whom the task was confided. They set up shelters and encampments in woods hitherto unexplored, carrying on their backs beds, clothing and provisions, as they had often to live two or three leagues from any dwelling. It was frequently necessary to lower by ropes down the precipices the men who had to prepare the plans amid empty space, and the snow and avalanches more than once threatened to stop them summarily in their work. The result has been to put before the Emperor eighty kilometers of iron way in the Helvetic Alps, forty-four of which will be covered over, twenty-three in tunnels and twenty-one in galleries. All these passages are ventilated either by shafts for the tunnels, or lateral openings for the galleries. These openings, cut at different points into arcades, have a startling appearance. They are veritable promenades a thousand metres above the sea, offering the same security as those of the Rue de Rivoli, which they resemble, but presenting a more picturesque and varied panorama. The execution of the plan, according to the authors, would occupy less than five years. At the end of this month the complete project of crossing the Alps by the Simplon will be officially submitted to the Governments of France, Italy, and Switzerland. The estimated cost of this great project, including the fixed and rolling material, the interest of the capital employed, etc., is seventy-two million francs.
