

To Farmers and Quartermasters.

ASSISTANT QUARTERMASTER GEN'S OFFICE, RICHMOND, VA., 13th June, 1863. TAX IN KIND.

THE following is the system adopted for the collection of the tax in kind:

An officer of the Quartermaster General's Department is assigned to the special charge of the subject A controlling Quartermaster, with the rank of Major, is assigned to each State, and a Post Quartermaster with the rank of Captain, to each Congressional Dis-trict, where it is practicable to collect the tenth Each Congressional District will be sub-livited by the Post Quartermuster in charge of it into sections, for the convenient delivery by the tax-payer of his quots of produce, and agents will be appointed by that officer to take charge of the depots to be established in each section. Before these dep to can be established, or the assess ments required under the law be made, the crops of small grain, hay and the clip of wool for the present year will have been secured.

To relieve farmers from the risk and inconvenience of storing the Government portion, as well as to obtain immediate supplies for the use of the army, the Department authorizes and requests farmers residing near posts where Quactermasters are now stationed to deliver the Government's tenth, or any part of it to that Quar-

Under the law, farmers are required to deliver their tenth at depots not more than eight miles from the place of production. If they will deliver under this re-quest, the Government will pay for the transportation in excess of eight miles. Gen. Imboden's Operations .- A correspondent of the Sentinel, writing from Hampshire county, June 21st, gives an account of the recent operations of Gen. Imboden's command, a portion of which we copy:

Gen. Imboden, who commands this brigade, has operated as a "flanker" to Ewell. On the 9th, he crossed the Shenandoah mountains to Moorefield, in Hardy county, sent back a fine drove of cattle; pushed on to Romney, the Federals, 1,500 in number, retreating to New Creek, a depot on the Baltimore and Ohio railroad. Onward he pressed to Springfield-the enemy there also fallng back to their strong position at New Creek. He commenced threatening New Creek, the

enemy being 4000 strong, and meantime sent a regiment of cavalry around them, and captured Cumberland, Maryland, one mile and a half from the Pennsylvania line. We were the first Rebels in Cumberland since the war. It is a beautiful city, containing sixteen thousand inhabitants, So completely had the enemy been deceived by the feint on New Creek, that Cumberland surrendered without much resistance. Some ammunition and quartermaster stores were found, but their destruction would have laid the place in ashes. The regiment turned its attention to the fine bridges; these were utterly demolished, the wooden ones burned, the splendid iron ones knocked in fragments by rifle cannon. The dewas "put through" generally The people in Cumberland say the railroad

never would be rebuilt during this war. Jackson destroyed it considerably, but now it lies dismantled, or will soon, from Cumberland to Harper's Ferry. The fat cattle, horses and sheep, blocked the road, bellowing and blating-and such cattle! The country was in a perfect panic when they heard of the coming of "Imboden, the guerilla,"
