ASSISTANT QUARTERMASTER GEN'S OFFICE,
Richmond, Va., 13th June, 1863.
THE following is the system adopted for the collection of the tax in kind.
An officer of the Quartermaster General's Department is assigned to the special charge of the subject. A controlling Quartermaster, with the rank of Major, is assigned to each State, and a Post Quartermaster with the rank of Captain, to each Congressional District, where it is practicable to collect the tax.
Each Congressional District will be subdivided by the Post Quartermaster in charge of it into sections, for the convenient delivery by the tax payer of his quota of Cotton. This change is made at the instance of the Quartermaster at Raleigh, in order to make the terms of exchange uniform throughout the State.

BY THE GOVERNOR OF NORTH CAROLINA.
A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, for the protection of our people, as far as possible, against the evils of speculation, there continues to be necessary to prohibit the exportation of certain articles of our products beyond the limits of our State;
Now, therefore, I, ZEBULON B. VANCE, Governor of North Carolina, do issue this Proclamation, continuing the proclamation of June 8th in force for thirty days from and after the 13th instant, in regard to Cotton and Woolen Cloth, Cotton and Woolen Yarns, Leather and Shoes, subject to such exceptions, &c., as have been expressed in my proclamations heretofore on the subject of exportation.
In witness whereof, Zebulon B. Vance, Governor of North Carolina, has signed these presents and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed.
Done at the city of Raleigh, this 10th day of July, A. D. 1863, and in the year of American Independence the 87th.

Gen. Lee's Army.—We make the following extracts from a letter written by an intelligent young officer serving with our army in Pennsylvania, to his father, in this State. What he states of the spirit, physique and equipment of our troops, corresponds with all the accounts we receive.—*Richmond Whig.*

WILLIAMSPORT, June 25.—In coming on today I passed heavy columns of the army, and such a splendid array my eye never rested on. Splendidly equipped, thoroughly clad and shod, the troops trod with a lighter step, and are acknowledged by all to be in higher spirits than ever before upon any campaign. * * * Every eye beams with confidence and hope in the mighty army. * * * This gives Lee a powerful army, which cannot be conquered by Hooker, or any array of Yankees that can be raised in the U. S. The greater part of the day I have ridden in rear of our army, and I am sure I have not seen fifteen men going to the rear. There is no straggling, and you may rely upon it that the deeds of this campaign will transcend in glory those of all others previous. Gen. Lee and his Lieutenants are said to be in a high flow of spirits. The order from Lee to the whole army, which I read to-day, forbids any depredations upon private property in the enemy's country, but confining all power
